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Classroom Procedure:

- 1. Display the following questions: What is the introduction paragraph? Why are introductions necessary? Ask the students these questions.
- 2. Allow for response and discussion. Ask the students how they write introductions and what should be included in an introductory paragraph. Lead students to explain that introductions have a specific structure, just like other the body paragraphs in an essay. Ask the students: What should be included in an introductory paragraph? Is there a particular structure that your teachers are looking for? Allow for response and discussion.
- Distribute the Writing Introductions content pages. Read and review the information with the students. Save the final questions for the lesson closing. Use the additional resources to enhance understanding in and out of the classroom.
- 4. Distribute the Activity page. Read and review the instructions. Have students check their answers with a partner to see if their answers match. Allow time for completion.
- 5. Once completed, have students share their answers with the class. Ask the following questions: What is an attention-getting device or hook? What can be included in this section of the introduction? What is the background, and what should be included? What is a thesis statement? What is its purpose?
- 7. Distribute the Practice page. Check and review the students' responses.
- 8. Distribute the Homework page. The next day, check and review the students' responses.
- 9. In closing, ask students: What is the purpose of an introductory paragraph? What structure is needed in an introductory paragraph? What should be included?
- 10. Allow for response and discussion.

Lesson Title: Introduction Writing

Subject: Language Arts

Approximate Grade Level: 4 - 5

Objectives: Students will identify the components of an introduction paragraph. They will pinpoint and craft attention-getting devices, background information for the topic, and thesis statements. Students will write introductions for various topics and purposes.

Options for Lesson: As an alternative or introductory lesson, cut out the different parts of an introductory paragraph from a magazine (attention-getting device, background information, and the thesis statement). Mix the parts and have the students put the sentences back into order identifying each part of the introduction. This will make it easier for the students to see why the order is important when crafting and writing introductions. This process will be more straightforward for students to understand what should go next and why it makes sense.

they do not have a vast amount of experience writing separate introductions and incorporating a planned structure in their introductory paragraphs. Students at this age usually just 'jump in' when writing. This lesson will help them understand the proper structure and sequence to use when writing introductions in longer writing assignments



Section 1 Writing Introductions

By now, you are very familiar with writing. When your teacher gives you an assignment, you immediately 'take off' and answer the question. Many writing assignments or writing prompts just have you immediately answer the question, but what about longer prompts or questions? What do you do then?

For full writing assignments or essays, you need to have an introduction, body paragraphs, and a conclusion. Today, you will focus on writing introductions. **Introductory paragraphs** help you ease into your topic and get your readers ready for what you discuss in your essay or more extended writing prompt.

What is the proper structure for introductions?

Proper paragraph structure for introductions includes an **attention-getting device** or hook, **background information**, and a **thesis statement**.

A. Attention-Getting Device or Hook

- Attention-getting devices or hooks are just a few sentences long.
- The purpose of an attention-getting device or hook is to grab the audience's attention and get them ready to read your writing.
- An attention-getting device or hook can be a question you ask your audience, a quote from a book or the Internet, or even an anecdote or made-up story.

B. Background Information

- The background section of an introduction contains sentences about the topic.
- The background section gives the readers a general overview of the topic so the audience can grasp an understanding of what they will be writing about.

C. Thesis Statement

- The thesis statement is the most crucial sentence in a writer's essay.
- A thesis statement is the main topic of the entire essay. It is what the whole paper is about.



Section 2 Title: Writing Introductions: Attention-getting Device

The first element needed in an introduction is the **attention-getting device** or **hook.** Attention-getting devices or hooks are used in the opening of essays to grab the audience's attention. If you don't get the audience's attention, then the audience will not be excited to read your paper. They may even be bored!

The attention-getting device, or often called the hook, can be in different forms. You can ask the audience a question, use a quote that includes the author's name, or even tell a little a story.

Below is an example introductory paragraph about sea turtles. The attention-getting device or hook is highlighted in red.

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The next element needed in an introductory paragraph is **background information**. The background in the introduction gives readers a bit more information before you get to your points later on in the body paragraphs.



Section 3 Title: Writing Introductions: Background Information

The **background information** does not have to be very specific or even long. You want to make sure that you do not bring up what you plan to mention later in your body paragraphs. If you do that, then your writing will become repetitive. The background in the introduction should contain general information about your topic. This will help the audience understand what you will be writing about so they can follow along.

Below is an example introductory paragraph about sea turtles. The background information is highlighted in red.

The reason they come on land is to lay their eggs. Sea turtles are very majestic creatures that many people do not understand because they are not around them. What do you notice about the background information? Is the author giving you too much information or too little information about the topic?

The last element in an introductory paragraph is the **thesis statement**. A thesis statement appears in the last sentence of the introduction, and it is always just one sentence long. The thesis statement describes to the audience what the entire essay will be about. The thesis statement is similar to a topic sentence. A topic sentence in a body paragraph explains what a body paragraph will be about. Similarly, a thesis statement tells what the entire essay will be covering. It is essential to include your main points in the thesis statement.

On the next page is an example introductory paragraph about sea turtles. The thesis statement is highlighted in red.

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In summary, the introductory paragraph has three parts.

- Attention-getting device or hook
- Background information
- Thesis statement
